

Adventures in Publicity

Our April newsletter had a limping one-liner about Farm City Day in Hendersonville, NC coming up on Oct. 2. Due to a dispute between the president's and the secretary's computers, a detailed description failed to follow. Our "trouble shooting" publicity networker (M. Gasque) had arranged for us to be invited (and quite enthusiastically) by the Farm City Day Cooperative Extension, to participate in this annual affair. This meant setting up a booth and doing demonstrations, answering questions, passing out literature, etc. We were not slow to accept - and with equal enthusiasm.

Shortly afterwards I made a trip to Jackson Park, a huge and very impressive public facility in S. Hendersonville, to scout an area suitable not only for a booth (and tent), but to best demonstrate how to dowse earth energies (i.e., water veins, fault lines, energy vortexes, etc.). FCD Director Diane Ashburn very graciously zoomed me around the entire complex (including athletic fields and display areas), I with L rods in hand to do just that: Locate the perfect spot. The first time I had ever dowsed by golf cart. Fun!

To my dismay, the only "ideal" spot (because it also provided a buried water pipe) was too close to the access route for the expected hoards of visitors. So I had to settle for second best: a remote corner of the farthest soccer field, far from the main activity. where few visitors - all of them with kids- would likely venture except the very curious. But, purist that I was, that was the only spot in the whole place that I felt dowsers could truly "show their stuff", where the earth energies had con-spired and converged to be dowsed.

Congratulations to Marilyn Gasque's grandmother, Ella Clark Nuite, who won the America's Oldest Worker award from Experience Works this October. Mrs. Nuite, at 100, is the owner and manager of the Windsor Spring Water Company.

"Mrs. Nuite works forty hours a week running her business in Hephzibah, Ga. She believes that work has improved her health, and says she has no intention of retiring. She handles the bookkeeping, answers the phone, and does retail business at the plant. She also oversees required testing of the water. She ran the business alone until she was 80 years old, when her grandson became involved. In her spare time, she also is landlord of nine homes she has purchased and renovated over the years. "She is the first woman and first owner/operator of a small business to be honored,"

said Eileen Walsh, president and CEO of Experience Works. "She is a wonderful role model for those who believe that age should not be a barrier to making significant contributions to society."

"Born in Augusta, February 11, 1904, she attended University of Georgia, earning a bachelor's degree in Home Economics. She taught home economics until 1930, but gave up teaching during the Great Depression because women were expected to give up their jobs to allow men to work. Later she held a number of positions, including census taker, postmistress, and dietician and dining manager for a conference center. In 1961, she inherited the family business from her mother.

- PRESIDENT'S CORNER CONTINUED -

No sooner was I fumbling with my makeshift and shoddy "tent" and trying to set up camp, than out of the mist (as if out of the dim past) emerged a ghostly figure wearing a tattered fishing hat. Was it one of those many whom I had sent on with best wishes (as dowsers frequently do) returning with a message - or guidance perhaps? No, as it floated closer I saw that it was our indomitable Lee - not the legend of Antitam or Chancellorsville, but ours of Waynesville. I knew we were in business, visitors or no. In no time, with his organizational skills, experience in teaching and array of demonstration equipment, we were set up with tarpolin, display tables full of educational materials, reclining chairs, staked-off dowsable energy lines, etc., and ready for the onslaught of parents and children eager to be awakened to the wonders of the Ancient Science.

Later, as Father Sun rose in the sky and cleared the fog of ignorance, we were joined by other stalwart dowsers to (wo)man the operation: Marilyn Gasque, Grace Maxwell, Kate Pittman and her husband "Red", and Becky Holmes of Charlotte. How they found us is still a mystery-female instinct no doubt. (That's what happens when you dowse long enough.) This was the case, unfortunately, with the festival visitors as well. In fact, noting our isolation and scarcity of customers, the festival organizers re-routed the horse & buggy rides to skirt our area to expose the kids to the Secret Science, the opportunities for salesmanship of which were not lost to Kate Pittman. Dowsing does bring out one's hidden skills. Lee did most of the teaching and demonstrating while the rest of us consulted- more or less persuasively- with parents. In all we recruited a grand total of three signatures and addresses for further information on dowsing. Room for improvement there, but one never knows what seeds have been sown.

All was not lost, however. It never is with dowsing and trying to spread the word. The six of us had some intense dowsing and exchange of ideas among us all day long and came away enriched by the whole experience, having learned from each other. After all, every dowser's path and gifts are absolutely unique. No-one has a monopoly on the truth; our job is to share and support each other and avoid comparisons. Some lessons for me on all this: accept your mistakes, learn to work with focus and trust (and with gratitude) on what you are given, see limitations as a challenge to learn, pay attention to details and share with others in the dowsing venture. Oh, and have fun doing it! That we did.

Footnote: We have been graciously invited back next year, with a promise to put us in a more advantageous place. I will hold them to that: my first choice, in fact. Happy dowsing and spread the word.

Walt Woods, 1996. <u>Letter to Robin: A Mini-course in Pendulum Dowsing</u>, 10th Revision. American Society of Dowsers, 20 pgs. - excellent intro to dowsing techniques and need for clear mental programming, (available free on-line, <u>www.lettertorobin.org/</u>)

Tom Graves, 1990, The Diviner's Handbook: A Guide to the Timeless Art of Dowsing, Destiny Books, 187 pgs. – practical intro to techniques and applications.

Terry Edward Ross and Richard D. Wright. 1990. <u>The Divining Mind: A Guide to Dowsing and Self-awareness.</u> Destiny Books. 130 pgs. — wonderful book on practical dowsing techniques, grounding the divining process, and advanced concepts in dowsing. Terry Ross was widely acclaimed as one of the best dowsers in modern history.

Sig Longren. 1986. Spiritual Dowsing. Gothic Image Publ. 107 pgs. — nicely illustrated, includes Tools of the Trade, dowsing Earth Energies, and Dowsing and Healing. Sig is active in Mid-Atlantic Geomancy, www.geomancy.org.

Tom Graves. 1990. The Dowser's Workbook: Understanding and Using the Power of Dowsing. Sterling Publishing. 173 pgs. — a step-by-step guide with 114 exercises for beginning and advanced dowsers. Highly recommended for skill building.

George Applegate. 1997. The Complete Book of Dowsing: The Definitive Guide to Finding Underground Water. Element Books. 302 pgs. – the best review of water dowsing techniques with extensive geological illustrations.

Christopher Bird. 1993. The Divining Hand: The 500-Year-Old Mystery of Dowsing (the art of searching for water, oil, minerals, and other natural resources or anything lost, missing or badly needed.) Whitford Press. 372 pgs. — classic overview of the history of dowsing. Little on techniques, but the best review of dowsing people and techniques.

Leroy Bull. 2001. The Art and Craft of Map Dowsing: A Workbook. Minute Man Press. 29 pgs. — wonderful introduction and "theory on how we interact with the Universe." Includes a dozen basic techniques on map dowsing (a form of remote viewing.) This is my favorite book on developing my trust in map dowsing.

Dale Olsen. 1996. Pendulum Charts: Learn to Access your Natural Intuitive Abilities & Take the Guesswork Out of Life. Crystalline Publ. 44 pgs. — a wonderful collection of dowsable pie-charts primarily for use with pendulums. Includes nutritional supplements, allergies, and even car trouble diagnosis. (note there is a new edition with additional charts. His 190 page book, Knowing Your Intuitive Mind, is also recommended)

GETTING TO WARREN WILSON COLLEGE

*Driving east on I-40 take Exit # 55, go underneath the interstate and turn R onto Hwy 70 and go east for two miles. Turn L at the first traffic light onto Warren Wilson Rd, and go I.5 miles to the campus. Continue straight up the hill past the first entrance to the campus on your right to the intersection at the top. Turn L, onto Chapel Dr. The WWC chapel is straight ahead. Park in the lot or on the road to the left of the chapel. Fellowship Hall is behind the chapel, off the back end of it. Enter the Hall via a walkway along the right side of the chapel or off the road on the left side, where you will have to follow a path up to the ground level.

If you are driving west on I-40, take Exit # 59, turn R, go to the traffic light and turn L onto Hwy 70. Proceed west on Hwy 70 for about three miles and turn R at the traffic light onto Warren Wilson Rd. Then follow the above directions into campus and on to the Presbyterian chapel.

QUARTERLY MEETING NOTES
